Language Statistics Nationally

- Today Over 63 million in this country speak a language other than English at home
 - -Represents 21.1% of the total population
- •Growing Need:
 - –2010: just over 57 million people who spoke a language other than English at home
 - –2000: just under 47 million people who spoke a language other than English at home

Language Proficiency Definition

- Speaking English "less than very well"
- Census Bureau research has shown:
 - Most respondents over-estimate their English proficiency
 - Only those who report speaking a language other than English at home AND speak English "very well" perform as well on tests as Englishonly speakers

Which LEP rate?

- •LEP rate of the entire population v. LEP rate of those who speak a language other than English at home
- Although only 8.5% of the total population are LEP, 40.3% of those who speak a language other than English at home are LEP

Voting Rights Act Section 203

- Applies only to Latinos, Asian Americans, American Indians, and Alaskan Natives
- Congress continually found that these groups have faced and continue to face significant voting discrimination because of their race and ethnicity.
- •Other language groups were not included because Congress did not find evidence that it experienced similar sustained difficulties because of their race and ethnicity in voting when they enacted the provision.

Importance of 2020 Census for Language Access

- Accurate data needed for coverage formula
 - —An unfair and inaccurate census will negatively skew the ACS.
 - Lower participation by language minorities could mean missed Section 203 coverage
- Accurate Data needed for compliance
 - -Utility for targeting, dialect determination, etc.
- Accurate Data needed for future planning
 - -Determining just missed language groups



Challenges facing a fair and accurate 2020 census

- Climate of fear: threatens participation in many communities
 - Last-minute addition of untested Citizenship Question
- Inadequate Annual funding (appropriations)
 - Congress set unrealistic cap on 2020 Census cost
 - Decades-long underfunding
 - Must have needed funding from now through Census 2020
 - At risk: census operations specifically designed to reach hard-tocount communities, which would exacerbate historical undercount

First high-tech census:

- Cyber security threats, real and perceived
- Digital divide
- Complex new IT system over budget and behind schedule

Leadership vacuum:

 No Census Director for over a year; new nomination – needs careful Senate vetting during confirmation process



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
