#### **Questions:**

1. Without the existing Clearinghouse function of the EAC, what alternatives would you and your organization have for collecting comparable information? Can you estimate the costs that might be associated with that collection?

- 2. Are there impediments to utilizing EAC Clearinghouse information? Are these impediments structural (related to the data itself), technological (data formats and accessibility issues) or otherwise?
- 3. Applications that are designed to accommodate expert as well as novice users, rarely succeed in satisfying both user groups. How would you assess the EAC Clearinghouse functionality for the expert user? For the novice?
- 4. What aspects of the Clearinghouse function do you routinely use? To what purpose do you use this information?

#### **Future Directions for the Clearinghouse**

The EAC Clearinghouse function has evolved to meet the needs of the election community it serves. Election administration and the technologies it depends upon, continues to change in response to state law, emerging technologies, procedural innovations, and voter expectations. What are the future challenges and opportunities for the Clearinghouse?

#### **Questions:**

- The efforts required to initiate a project are usually very different from those required to maintain the project. The leadership skills, priorities, skill sets, etc., that were needed to launch the EAC Clearinghouse efforts may be very different from those needed to maintain its quality. Discuss the EAC's strategy to address this emerging custodial role of the Clearinghouse
- 2. Information has many dimensions: currency, depth, and breadth, to name a few. How should the EAC determine the priorities within its information silos of the Clearinghouse? Which areas should be broadened? Deepened? Any that should be eliminated or capped?
- 3. What are the emerging needs of the jurisdictions regarding Clearinghouse information? Are there new subject areas that should be planned for?
- 4. Having access to the information in a format that is ill-suited for follow-on use can be as frustrating as not having the information at all. Are there ways in which the EAC could better provide existing information?
- 5. Are there ways the EAC can better integrate its information with other complimentary sources, minimizing the efforts of researchers and practitioners to collect and integrate relevant information? Are there portal models that would be of instructive for the EAC to consider?
